(Sense-of-the-Assembly Resolution)

RESOLUTION CONCERNING GENDER EQUITY IN HEALTH RESEARCH

ADOPTED by the General Assembly

WHEREAS, a preponderance of clinical research projects on health problems which affect both women and men has employed only male subjects, resulting in the application of data to the treatment of both men and women that may not be valid for women; and

WHEREAS, women have routinely been omitted from heart studies, resulting in physicians knowing less about the course of heart disease in women, what prevents it and how to treat it, although it has recently been established that heart disease is the leading cause of death in women as well as in men (source #7); and

WHEREAS, less than 14% of the \$7.6 billion research budget of the National Institutes of Health in 1990 went to women's health issues, even though women make up more than half of the population (source #9); and

WHEREAS, only \$17 million is spent annually by the National Cancer Institute to investigate the underlying causes of breast cancer, although breast cancer is projected to afflict one in nine American women this year, an increase from one in 20 in 1960, and although breast cancer mortality is five times as high in North America and Northern Europe as it is in Asia and Africa (sources #3,#8); and

WHEREAS, there is a dearth of money currently believed.
